


Bertrand Russell's quote, 'The world is full of subjective nature of human experiences.

Let's celebrate

The magic of

Rotary International President-elect Stephanie Urchick announced that the 2024-25 presidential theme is The Magic of Rotary and called on members to recognize and amplify the organization's power to save lives.

"Don't misunderstand me – we are not going to end polio or bring peace to the world by waving a wand and saying some funny words," Urchick told incoming district governors at the Rotary International Assembly on 8 January. "It's up to you. You create the magic with every project completed, every dollar donated, and every new member."

Urchick, a member of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, USA, said she saw the magic of Rotary on display when she was helping install water filters in the Dominican Republic. Two boys were watching as dirty water entered the filter, then ran out clean at the other end.

"One of the boys grabbed my sleeve and said, 'Show me the magic again," she said. "Obviously, the water filter wasn't magic. We worked hard to transport those filters, install them, and work with community leaders in the area to maintain them. But those boys knew that easy access to clean water would change their lives. Knowing that I played a small part in that certainly changed my life."

Rotary has a long history of promoting peace through its network of peace centers, Urchick noted. Located at top universities around the globe, the centers have trained nearly 1,800 peace fellows who are now working in more than 140 countries. The newest center, located at Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul, Turkey, will welcome its first class of fellows in early 2025.

One way to make positive change, she said, is to embrace the principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion within clubs.

"I hope you'll join me in opening your arms to future people of action, even if - and in some cases, especially if - they don't look or act like the typical member of your local club," she said. "With DEI, it is easier to be united in a common purpose. It's in those moments when we are committed and focused that we are the most effective and relevant."




Incoming AG's message

- The success of diversity and inclusion initiatives often lies in leadership's commitment, coupled with ongoing education to combat unconscious biases and misconceptions.
- To create a truly diverse and inclusive environment, it's important to be proactive, open, and ready to meet the challenges that arise.
- Regular and practical diversity training is crucial in equipping employees /members with the necessary skills to foster inclusivity.
- To do all this and practically realise positive results, we need to foster Inclusive Leadership.

The good news is that there are some highly effective ways to help transform leadership's mindset, starting with:

- Fostering Genuine Commitment: Training sessions focused on cultural awareness, the importance of empathy, and inclusive decision-making can motivate leaders to actively support diversity initiatives.
- Set Clear Targets: Incorporate diversity and inclusion targets into leadership's performance evaluation. This ensures commitment extends beyond words into meaningful action.
- Involve Leadership in Initiatives: Encourage leaders to be active participants in the diversity initiatives your organization wants to spearhead. This will help them invest more energy in seeing it through.



Even though changing to a more diverse and inclusive environment is healthier, resistance and opposition should be expected and prepared for. After all, it's hardwired into our brains.

Regardless of their job title, employees/members can feel threatened by the proposed inclusion culture for fear of losing their position. They may show their resistance subtly or more pronounced (depending on their position in the organization).

But either form can stagnate progress, putting a chokehold on the positive impacts a diverse and inclusive environment can bring to an organization.

Without a clear understanding of the benefits of diversity and inclusion, employees/members may perceive these efforts as unnecessary or believe that this new culture is unnecessarily sidetracking the organization's fundamental objectives.

One potent way to set the tone of inclusivity from the get-go is through correct name pronunciation. A correctly pronounced name is the first step toward respect and recognition. And with how complex and sensitive our rotary tittles can be, we need to find a way to work around that.

The initiative, which is aimed at addressing critical issues faced by the boy child in Uganda, seeks to solve the problem of the increased number of boys dropping out of school with statistics indicating that for every 10 boys that start school at kindergarten, only three successfully make it to tertiary institutional level.

Led by the president Christine Nalubwama, Mbogo Mixed students were eager to listen in to what the members of Nansana Rotary Club had come with for them.

The discussions of the day were guided by the questions, "Who is responsible for your future?" and "What kind of father/dad do you want to be?".

The answers given by the boys were very interesting and had students mention things like wanting to be a rich father, a patient father, a calm father, a God-fearing father, a present father, a responsible father, to mention but a few.



On the question of who was responsible for their future, many agreed that it was themselves as individuals to pull through and become what they desire.

The engagement didn't not leave out the challenges of the boy child that they faced and the Rotarians present were on hand to assuage a few of these worries.

Being a mixed school, the girls weren't excluded from the day's activities as engagements with them on how to treat boys and have respect for each other came in handy.

And indeed, Rotary as a whole does appreciate the girls for shinning and trending in everything, but decided to come up with the boy child initiative to ensure that the boys are equally cared for like the girls.

On top of the boy child talk, President Christine led the school authorities and students into planting trees as a way of creating a sustainable environment for future generations.



serve cocktails there, did you?).


Getting more involved.


